UCR's very own Brian L. Haynes, Ph.D. Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, graciously shares his insight as a reflection on the importance of the holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.:

Words cannot adequately capture the significance of the federal holiday that we as a country recognize annually on the third Monday of January; Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. First observed in 1986, the holiday is named in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. an African-American champion and leader of the Civil Rights Movement, which effectively ended the Jim Crow era of American history. Although Dr. King was assassinated nearly 51 years ago (April 4, 1968), his legacy stands as a shiny beacon of hope for millions of people around the globe fighting for equality and justice. Dr.

King's famous "I Have a Dream Speech" delivered on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. on August 28, 1963 remains one of the most important speeches in American history. In that speech Dr. King exhorted us to "Let Freedom Ring" and envision a world where everyone was equal. Let us as a society come together today continuing to dream while working toward a world where freedom, equality, and social justice will ring for all!

As we look to the past to create a better future, we honor the innumerable contributions of the African diaspora. Moving into African American History Month in February, I hope we continue to keep Dr. King's legacy in our hearts and minds, and reflected in our actions.
